FREEDMEN'S BUREAU INDEXING TRAINING - The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Cultural Hall, 5300 Auth Road, Suitland, MD 20746, Thursday, September 10, 2015, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. - Join AAHGS-PGCM and participate in the nationwide Freedmen's Bureau Project*. The Freedmen's Bureau was organized near the end of the American Civil War to assist newly freed slaves in 15 States and the District of Columbia. The Bureau opened schools, managed hospitals, rationed food and clothing for the destitute, solemnized marriages, and much more. In the process it gathered priceless handwritten, personal information on potentially 4 million African Americans.

The purpose of the Freedmen's Bureau Project is to index records for those four million former slaves for the period 1865 thru 1872. Indexing will make records created by the Freedmen's Bureau searchable online. When completed, the index will make it easier to find information online about African American ancestors torn apart by slavery. Types of records to be indexed include:

- Education Records
- Labor Contracts, Indentures and Apprenticeship Records
- Land and Property Records



- Court Records
- Hospital and Patients' Records
- Records of Complaint
